Kimberly Maddy's journey to the Michigan State USBC Hall of Fame started at the age of two. She went regularly with her grandparents to watch them bowl their leagues. At age 5, Kim would begin bowling in the youth program at All-Star Lanes (formerly Colonial), the same program in which her father had started his bowling career. Kim fell in love with bowling as a youth bowler. Her father would take her to practice weekly. Kim hated leaving the bowling center after the practice sessions would end. All the practice however, would lead to a stellar youth career in the Metro Detroit area.

During the 2003 Metro Detroit Youth City Championships at Sunnybrook Lanes in Sterling Heights, Kim would have a 300 game during the team event at age 16. She credits her brother who just happened to be bowling on the same pair of lanes with keeping her on track during that honor score game. Once Kim joined the adult ranks, she would find success on the lanes in the prestigious S & B Ladies

League and the Luxury Ladies at Luxury Lanes. Kim even bowled in a men's league at Bowl One Lanes. In tournaments Kim would also find a niche. Kim was part of winning teams at the state and local level. In Metro Detroit USBC she would win several local titles and make many all-city team appearances.

The other side of Kim's bowling journey is she has been a high school bowling coach since her junior year. Michigan high school bowling was in its infancy when Kim was in high school. In those early years of high school bowling, youth bowlers were often given the choice between bowling for their school or staying in their YABA leagues and tournaments. Kim would pick the YABA route as her choice. She saw many more opportunities in her Ward Youth Travel League and various YABA sanctioned youth tournaments. Kim was asked to be a student coach for her school, Utica High School. This compromise would let Kim be part of high school bowling and keep her youth career rolling. It was during this time Kim caught the coaching bug. Now Kim coaches the Sterling Heights Stevenson High School bowling team. She has also become involved with the Michigan High School Bowling Coaches Association. Kim serves this organization as a board member.

Highlights of Kim's bowling career include: 3 - Michigan State USBC Women's Actual Team Championships, 2 – 800 series, 8 – 300 games, and 6 – 299 games including one in the 2024 MSUSBC Women's Championships, 1st place All-Events Actual in Michigan State Mixed Tournament.
