Brandie Reamy-Johnson's bowling journey started at the very beginning of her life. Her mother Linda refused to stop bowling in her mixed league despite being very pregnant. Linda, a passionate bowler in her own right wanted to continue as long as possible. Linda and her husband Brian would have Brandie bowling as soon as she could walk.

The rest of the world would learn of Brandie Reamy in 2006 when she would become the youngest female in the country to bowl a 300 game. At just 12 years and 4 months, Brandie bowled a perfect game at Country Lanes in Farmington Hills during a league session of the Sunday Youth Classic Travel League. The record would stand for a few years. At this point in her bowling life, Brandie would become the girl to watch on the lanes. From her perspective, this would be the time of her life, she would make lifelong friends because of the game of bowling. She helped her mom with her youth leagues at Wonderland Lanes where Linda was youth director. She was bowling well in all kinds of tournaments like Junior Gold. In 2014, her youth bowling career would culminate in the Michigan State USBC Women's Bowling Association "Star of Tomorrow" Award and Scholarship.

As an adult bowler, Brandie has lived up to her "Star" status on the lanes. Her adult bowling career includes the following highlights: Brandie became the "Lady on the Entry" when she won the 2017 Michigan State USBC Queens Tournament. She won the Jackson UBSC Queens Tournament in 2019, 2020, and 2023. Brandie won the Detroit Women's Series Cup in the 2016-2017 season. She has won five Detroit Women's Series competitions. Brandie has captured women's state tournament titles in all-events, singles, and team. She has been a member of the Metro Detroit Women's All-City Team for six years. She bowls when she can in PWBA regional events, local events, TNBA events, and state competitions. Brandie has achieved success at all different events. Brandie has bowled 7 more sanctioned 300 games. Her favorite 300 games are from an unsanctioned tournament though. In the Kings & Queens Tournament at Royal Scot, Brandie bowled back-to-back 300 games.

Bowling gave Brandie one more title. Mrs. Johnson. She met her forever bowling partner, Gerald Johnson at a PBA event. They met, became friends, married, blended their families, and are now living a happily-ever-after bowling life. The Johnsons understand the importance of the game of bowling in each other's lives. A match made in bowling heaven.

Brandie is still very hungry for the game and is looking towards the future. In the near future is a first-time trip to the USBC Women's Championship in 2026. The next school year may also be a chance for this new Hall of Famer to become a new high school bowling coach. If things can be worked out, Brandie could get the chance to coach her daughter, Sophia and the girls' team at Franklin High School in Livonia. Whatever the future holds, we wish Brandie much continued success both on the lanes, and off.
