A chance opportunity one night to sub in a league with her then best friend and her mother would lead this former collegiate basketball player down a very different road. Stacey was convinced to bowl that night as a “Girls Night Out”. She used a house ball and rental shoes that first time and was hooked for life. After subbing in that league, Stacey started to practice, coaching herself by watching others bowlers at their craft. Within a year, Stacey would roll her first 299 game in a tournament. She now looks back at that first 299 game and laughs as all eleven strikes were Brooklyn’s. Soon others noticed Stacey’s talent and offered to help her with her game. Amos Mathis began coaching her in the finer points of the game. The Larabell Family, especially Michelle, who owned a bowling center in Grand Rapids offered her time and a place to practice. The young 20 something Stacey was now on her way to the Hall of Fame.

In 2007, Stacey moved briefly to Chicago to follow her bowling dreams. She would find success in the Windy City, make lifelong friends, and become even more competitive with her game. Michigan would get Stacey back in 2014, when her family needed her. Her dedication to her bowling did not wane. Stacey looked for more competition and ways to challenge herself. The 40 hour a week product colorist is a dedicated bowler after hours and on most weekends. Her bowling schedule is exhausting. She logs many miles each week in her 2006 Silver Saturn Vue. Stacey bowls in Kalamazoo on Friday nights, Thunderbowl in Allen Park on Wednesday nights, and when her tournament schedule allows she bowls in Chicago in a mixed league on Saturday night.

Stacey has accomplished a lot of goals in her bowling career but she is still hungry. She would like to be the first woman to bowl a 900 series. Along the way, Stacey has collected a strong group of friends through bowling and she is appreciative for all their love and support on her journey.
